





Advanced Conveyance Inspections

During this interactive session, Supply Chain Security Specialists will demonstrate the 17 point truck and trailer inspection and examination techniques with respect to aircraft unit load devices. GPS tracking and sealing procedures will also be reviewed.

Verifying Security Measures

CUSTOMS-TRADE PARTNERSHIP AGAINST TERRORISM

United States Customs and Border Protection (CBP) is the unified border agency within the Department of Homeland Security (DHS). CBP is the frontline border agency tasked with the dual mission of securing the Nation's borders while facilitating legitimate trade and travel. This requires protecting against cross-border violations that threaten national security, the economy, and public safety.

Securing the Nation's borders in today's environment demands a complex, layered approach. The border is not merely a physical frontier; therefore, effectively securing it requires attention to processes that begin far outside U.S. borders and to all regions of the United States. Recurrent and considerable threats to international security from terrorists and multinational criminal organizations continue to be a stark reality.

Established in 2001, the Customs-Trade Partnership Against Terrorism (C-TPAT) is a joint government-business initiative designed to strengthen overall supply chain and border security while facilitating legitimate, compliant trade. C-TPAT recognizes that CBP can provide the highest level of cargo security only through close cooperation with the ultimate owners of the international supply chain such as importers, manufacturers, carriers, licensed customs brokers, and consolidators.

To date, more than 10,000 companies have partnered with CBP. C-TPAT has matured as a program over time, and as a result of collaborative partnerships, has built upon the lessons learned of each validation. These experiences have enabled the program to provide member support in navigating the complexities of international trade while ensuring that the integrity of supply chain security practices is maintained.

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FY 2010 PIA Statistics

- Twenty-three (23) PIAs involving thirty-four (34) companies were conducted by C-TPAT
- Multiple factors contributed to each of the security breaches:
 - Lack of tracking/monitoring procedures: 61%
 - Business screening procedures: 22%
 - Improper inspection procedures: 13%
 - Lack of management oversight and accountability: 4%



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


- Employees are likely retain those topics which directly effect them,

- Your company's size and structure will dictate the direction of the C-TPAT and related security training you need to implement.




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
