摘要

此行目的主要代表台北大學參加奧瑞岡州立大學全球健康研究中心的成立大會，與其建立合作關係，進行實質的交流。初步已達成一些合作的共識，包括：台北大學的財政暨金融研究中心將與該校的全球健康中心簽訂合作協議，未來進行老師及研究生學術交流。該校目前在台灣的合作學校為台灣大學、陽明大學及輔仁大學，奧瑞岡州立大學副校長以及院長將於 2014 年秋天來台考察，將本校列入參訪行程，希望未來能落實兩校的師生進行交流。該校計畫派遣大學生到國外進行 10 周的海外課程，由該校及合作學校老師共同授課。對於台北大學擴展國際化是一絕佳契機，既能增加國際學生交流數量，又可獲得外國師資，有利本校學生外語課程選取多元化，提升學生與外國學生的互動機會。

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本文

(一)、目的

此行目的主要是代表台北大學參加奧瑞岡州立大學全球健康研究中心的成立大會，並且能與奧瑞岡州立大學建立合作關係，進行實質的交流。

(二)、過程

本人於 2014 年 6 月 3 日至 6 月 9 日間代表國立台北大學赴美國西岸奧瑞岡州的奧瑞岡州立大學(Oregon State University)進行學術交流及參訪。此行目的主要是代表台北大學參加奧瑞岡州立大學全球健康研究中心的成立大會，並且能與奧瑞岡州立大學建立合作關係，進行實質的交流。奧瑞岡州立大學的全球健康研究中心成立大會是以國際學術研討會的方式進行，邀請目前已有合作關係或未來可能建立合作關係的世界各國大學以及研究單位共襄盛舉，為期三天的研討會是在奧瑞岡州大的校友中心舉辦。本人於 6 月 3 日晚上由台灣出發，6 月 4 日到達奧瑞岡州大所在地的 Corvallis 市。6 月 5 日第一天上午有機會於大會中介紹國立台北大學的現況以及校園，並且擔任主持人的工作。第二天 6 月 6 日上午則擔任新的全球健康挑戰綜合座談的與談人，下午的研討會是由奧瑞岡州大的教授發表研究成果。研討會的主題是新國際健康及如何增進全球人民的健康，尤其是如何改善不公平的問題，資源的分配也是一大挑戰。根據研究顯示，所得最高的 10%人口大概使用了 50%的醫療資源，所得較低的人反而無法使用醫療資源，所以建構資源整合的系統，提供給真正需要的人，是未來必須努力的方向。各大學以及非營利組織都應該可以扮演積極的角色，使醫療資源的運用更有效率，不會造成浪費，不能夠只提供給高所得的人口使用。在各國專家的經驗分享後，可以了解許多落後國家在 21 世紀的今日，依舊連基本的安全飲水及衛生都無法保障，有待先進開發國家的協助。除此之外，應加強社會企業概念，才不會在落後國家中產生大量的血汗工廠，對於這些國家的人民並不公平，這些議題也需要更多的學者及研究人員進行研究，讓更多先進國家人民了解企業利潤或自身福利，可能是建構在犧牲他人健康或福利的基礎上，這樣的經濟成長並不適當。6 月 7 日上午是以分組方式進行，探討各與會大學或研究單位未來如何與奧瑞岡州立大學進行合作，希望能研討出具體的時間表及合作項目。本人在會議結束後的隔天 6 月 8 日離開 Corvallis 搭機返回台灣。

(三)、心得及建議

本次代表台北大學與奧瑞岡州立大學進行交流，初步已達成一些合作的共識。包括台北大學的財政與金融中心將與奧瑞岡州立大學的全球健康中心簽訂合作協議，未來可以互訪，老師及研究生皆可以進行學術交流。在學校的部分，目前奧瑞岡州立大學在台灣的合作學校是台灣大學、陽明大學及輔仁大學，奧瑞岡州立大學副校長以及院長將於 2014 年秋天來台灣考察，也會將台北大學列入參訪行程，希望未來能讓兩校的學生能進行交流。奧瑞岡州立大學希望能派遣其大學生到國外進行 10 周的海外課程，由奧瑞岡州大及合作學校老師共同授課，而且目標人數能達到其學生總數的 30%。因此對於國立台北大學全新的美麗校園留下深刻的印象，也顯示出濃厚的興趣，對於台北大學擴展國際化是一很好的合作對象。一方面能增加交流的國際學生數量，另一方面又可以有外國師資到台北大學開課，有利本國學生能選擇外語教授的課程，以及增加學生與外國學生的互動機會。本校學生也能到奧瑞岡州大的相關系所做交換學生，甚至取得學位。如果能促使兩校進行實質交流，相信對於提升台北大學的國際化程度一定有所幫助。

Breakout Sessions

Structure:

Breakout sessions are designed to promote face-to-face interaction on specific topics/programs. Each breakout session will have a theme along with a brief description. These themes will be identified during the first two days of discussion to reflect needs and opportunities of CGH partners.

Objective:

The core objective of the breakout session is to provide a structured forum for interaction among CGH's international partners, domestic partners, and key faculty members. Breakout groups will identify key areas of common needs/interests and develop a forward-looking plan with concrete actions to foster multi-way collaborations. The larger goal of these sessions is to identify opportunities for partnership that promote educational opportunities, capacity building, research, comprehensive health development, and services activities.

Discussion items for Breakout Session I: **Examples of Multi-way Collaborations**

1. Joint long-term internship programs

Description: OSU and its university partners, together with NGO/government partners develop a long-term community health program to which student interns will be an important contributor. Sponsoring NGO/government agencies will choose and organize the program, while partnering universities will organize student internship groups and supervising faculty members.

2. Student and faculty exchanges

Description: OSU and its university partners collaboratively organize joint student and faculty exchanges.

3. Education, training and workshop

Description: OSU and its university partners, together with NGO/government partners develop education and training programs aimed at strengthening the capacity of partners.

4. Other innovative multi-way collaborative programs
