

Outline of Operations

In 1975, the National Public Safety Commission permitted the Japan Safe Driving Center (JSDC) to be established, as an organization that would help prevent traffic accidents and enhance convenience for drivers, in line with the Japan Safe Driving Center Act. JSDC would fulfill this mission by training drivers to drive safely, providing information on driving history and traffic accidents, and conducting research on these, among other activities.

Since then, JSDC has endeavored to expand its operations and improve its services. In 1977, for example, it launched a system for issuing SD cards, and in 1991 established the Central Training School for Safe Driving.

JSDC's operations are broadly divided into the five areas shown below. Each of these will be explained in the following pages.

Traffic Safety: Enhancing Convenience for Drivers

Certification of traffic <u>accidents</u>

(1) Central Training School for Safe Driving (opened April 1st, 1991)

(Purpose)

To provide training in practical, specialized and advanced safe driving skills and knowledge, for core instructors and drivers in the community and occupational fields.

(Characteristics)

Recent training statistics

The Central Training School for Safe Driving provides the following training as Japan's most comprehensive safe driving training facility, located in Hitachinaka, Ibaraki Prefecture.

- Training on various courses reproducing actual roads, including a 5km high-speed oval track and a simulated urban area.
- Training to learn basics and applications for safe driving while experiencing the "limits of safe driving", which cannot be tested on public roads.
- Training how to escape from dangerous situations that would be difficult to simulate on normal roads.
- Integrated training by combining theory and practice, given by technical and theoretical instructors.

(2) Traffic Park

The facilities of the Central Training School for Safe Driving include a "Traffic Park", where children and pupils from kindergarten to junior high school experience actual training in a simulated urban area. Here, they learn traffic-related knowledge and manners, such as how to cross the road or ride a bicycle safely.

(1)Types of certificates

On request from drivers, we issue four different types of certificates related to a driver's driving history, the clean accident and offense record, driving record, points accumulated and driver's license history.

Clean Accident and Offense Record Certificate

This certifies that a driver has no record of accidents or traffic violations over a specified period. This certificate is used to encourage safe driving, praise good drivers, etc.



Certification of Points Accumulated

This certifies the current penalty points accumulated for traffic violations and accidents.

Driving Record Certificate

This certifies records of traffic violations, accidents and license endorsements in the past one to five year period. It is used to encourage safe driving, praise good drivers, etc., and is required when applying for or renewing a private taxi license.



Certification of Driver's License History

This certifies past lapsed or revoked licenses, the type of license currently held, the date it was obtained, etc.

(2)Application method and certification fees

Applications may be made via transfer from any branch of the Japan Postal Bank, after filling in an application form with the necessary details. Forms may be obtained at JSDC offices, police stations and police boxes. Also, you can apply directly to your nearest JSDC office. Companies and other organizations may apply on behalf of individuals by proxy. The fee is 630 yen per certificate.

(3)SD (Safe Driver) Cards

a. Significance and types

SD Cards are presented to anyone applying for a Clean Accident and Offense Record Certificate or Driving Record Certificate who has no record of accidents or traffic violations, for more than one year.

The SD Card is a respected documentation of safe driving, and possessing one should therefore enhance the holder's pride and self-awareness as a safe driver.

b. Special privileges for SD Card holders

SD Card holders can enjoy discounts on gasoline, meals, accommodation and other purchases, as well as preferential interest rates for car purchase loans. The number of businesses offering these privileges is increasing year by year, with about 25,000 merchants nationwide.



(1)Significance and method of use

Traffic accident certificates are issued on request from the parties involved in an accident. They state the date and time of the accident, the names and addresses of the parties involved, and other relevant details.

JSDC certifies these details based on data kept by the police. Among others, these certificates are used as supporting documents when claiming various kinds of automobile insurance benefits.

The certificates are prepared using personal information held by the police. As such, applications are only accepted from parties involved in a traffic accident (both at-fault and non-fault), or someone applying on their behalf by proxy.



(2)Application method and certification fees

Applications may be made via transfer from any post office, using an application form (transfer form). Forms may be obtained at JSDC offices, police stations, non-life insurance companies, etc. Also, you can apply directly to your nearest JSDC office.

The fee is 540 yen per certificate.

License suspensions and other penalties are implemented by the Prefectural Public Safety Commission (police) based on a points system. Drivers are given points for each traffic violation, and when the accumulated points reach six points, the license will be suspended or the driver will have to attend offender training.

We therefore notify drivers in writing when their accumulated points have reached four or five points. By doing so, we encourage them to be particularly attentive to traffic violations and accidents, and to take care to drive more safely.

We conduct research and investigation on the skills needed to drive safely, methods of preventing obstacles caused by road traffic and various types of driver behavior, etc. We publish the results in reports, research news bulletins, etc.

These results are then reflected in amendments to laws, ordinances and other traffic safety measures implemented by the government. They are also widely used as data for safe driving management in companies and instruction in driving schools.
